
responsibilities required by our by-laws and some things that just happened along the way. Without all of you, none of it would have been possible.

AMARILLO NAMED ONE OF THE MOST AFFORDABLE AND DESIRABLE PLACES TO LIVE (summarized by Rita Benton Bryant '55 from article in Amarillo Magazine December 2023 issue)

With Texas among the most moved to states in the nation, those moving to Texas have many cities to choose from. The city of Amarillo is regularly named among the most affordable and desirable to live in.

Business Insider (August 2023), listed Amarillo as the 13th most affordable in which to live in the United States. Forbes Advisor names Amarillo as the eighth best place to live in the state. Amarillo was also named among the top ten affordable and booming cities for a college graduate to buy a home. Overall, the city's cost of living is about 15.8% below the U.S. National Average so able to get more bang for their buck for their households. Local real estate brokerage firms noted that "Amarillo is the perfect place for someone to plant their roots and watch them grow and prosper."

An increase in diversity of industries and businesses are relocating to the Amarillo area. So, with the potential of the future job market and low comparable housing costs, the city is becoming a hub for companies on the interstate 27 corridor with agriculture, energy, and logistics.

The Amarillo unemployment rate of 3.2% is below the national average of 3.7% and the state average of 4,1%. Aviation and aerospace are two of the burgeoning industries that are growing the diversity of available jobs in the area.

With the high demand professionals within the city, home prices in Amarillo are about \$172,000 below the national median home price and about \$100,000 below the state's median price of \$240,000 as of September 2023. Home values have risen over 3% in the last year according to Zillow. Residents of Amarillo spend only 7.4% of their income on home expenses, which is half of the national average.

It is generally accepted that one of the greatest benefits of living in Amarillo is the short commute times, which can have you in any area within about 20 minutes.

As a part of metro that is over 200,000, many residents enjoy a growing city that still has the feel of a more rural area with access to a variety of outdoor adventures and activities. Chief among the area's natural sites is Palo Duro Canyon, the second largest in the United States, and known as the Grand Canyon of Texas. There are other multiple trails to hike within the canyon with scenic views such as the Lighthouse which is a 5.7 mile hiked to the iconic rock formation. Horseback riding and camping are also available in the State Park. From June through August of each year visitors can enjoy the Musical Drama *TEXAS* in the park's amphitheater.

Other attractions include:

- Working Ranch Cowboys Association Rodeo,
- Texas League Champions Amarillo Sod Poodles Baseball Team (AA minor league affiliate for the Arizona Diamondbacks),
- Route 66, once known as the Mother Road and one of the first major highways in the nation.
- Cadilac Ranch

Amarillo has such a unique culture that cannot be found anywhere else. It is the Beef Capital of the U. S. and home of the iconic Big Texan Restaurant. World famous for its 72-oz. steak with the trimmings which brings people from across the globe to finish the mighty place of beef in the hour allotted.

Two excellent school districts serve Amarillo for those moving to the area along with Amarillo College, awarded the Aspen Award for outstanding community college in the nation. Just outside of Amarillo is the City of Canyon, home of West Texas A&M University, a four-year college.

For those looking for an affordable city that is growing with a lot to offer with lower housing costs and a multitude of things to do, Amarillo is the one; the "CROWN JEWELL OF TEXAS.

It is a great joy to receive our AHS Newsletter and to keep up with the lives of so many schoolmates and of Amarillo itself, even if distance does not allow me to come to the meetings of our Association.

Since I graduated in 1958 as an AFS exchange student, I returned to my country, Italy, where I went to university and I got a degree in philosophy. I worked for several years at our national Museum of Cinema, until I got interested in international education and I founded an organization, called "Intercultura" that promotes international programs for secondary schools, including the AFS program I had been involved with in 1957-58.

In due time this has become the largest Italian organization in its field and it has established working relations with many intergovernmental institutions such ad UNESCO, Council of Europe, European Union and others. My work was recognized with an honorary doctor degree in education by the University of Padua.

At 84 I am still at work as the head of the Intercultura Foundation, a side organization set up by Intercultura 17 years ago, and now my activity focuses mainly on research, publications, courses for teachers and principals and international conferences.

For a long time I lived in Rome, but I am now settled down in Tuscany, in a hilly area between Florence and Siena. My year in Amarillo and AHS has made a lasting impact on my life: I am still in close contact with the McKay family, who hosted me and who have visited me many times in Italy. 
JOHN PRESTRIDGE, '57, MESA, ARIZONA
