THE HISTORY OF THE POLK STREET SCHOOLS HISTORICAL MARKER

POLK STREET SCHOOLS HISTORICAL MONUMENT

-- The Whole Story as related by Bob Damon '53

In 2008 the AHS 50th Alumni Association changed locations for its General Meetings from the Amarillo Public Library on 45th to the original site of AHS on Polk Street, I worked with Belle Taylor Gage'56 on details of the move. After we had finished, Belle pulled out a folder and said, "I think this would be a good project for the Alumni Association./" The folder contained print outs from the Texas Historical Commission website regarding Historical Markers. Belle had envisioned that the existing building, where the Senior Citizens organization is located could be declared a Historic Building

You will recall that this building was originally the AHS cafeteria, auto mechanics,. Etc. I took the material and as she had suggested, I called Lueise Tyson. Lueise is a member of the Potter County Historical Commission and has written, with the required documentation, over a dozen histories for Historical Markers. After studying the material from the Texas Historical Commission, it was decided that a Historical Site Marker would be a better choice. There is a great deal of history of public schools on Polk Street Amarillo's first brick public school, the Red Brick School was built in 1900 at 1200 S Polk. In 1910 the first Amarillo High School (which later became Central Junior High and then renamed Elizabeth Nixson Junior High) was built at 1300 S Polk. In 1922, the Red Brick school was razed and our Amarillo High School was constructed in its place. All of this history is contained on the Historical Site Marker.

Researching the history of Amarillo Schools took me to the Amarillo ISD Library, the downtown Public Library and finally, the Research Department in the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum in Canyon. Every place iwent I found folks who bent over backwards to help in the research on this project. Bear in mind that the THC requires documentation. Stories have been written about or schools, but without documentation, they cannot be used.

A committee was appointed to move the project along. All of this was taking place in early to mid-2008. The committee consisted of Bob Damon, Chairman, Belle Taylor Gage, Carroll Forrester, Ken Kohler, Tricia Dallas, D'Nard Hemphill, Rita Bryant and we later added Charlie Broomhead and Phyllis Hicks.

After I had compiled the various historical documents, I turned them over to Lueise Tyson. Lueise did a wonderful job writing the history with documentation. Because the THC will accept applications during a certain time of the year, we were not able to submit our application until September 2009. Not all applications are accepted, so we held our breath until we received word in February, 2010 that our application had been accepted

for processing. In July 2010, we received the first proposed inscription for the marker. Bear in mind that the THC has the final say on the content of the inscription. We could, and did, request some minor changes. On August 16, 2010, the THC ordered the marker.

During this time, we began to have meetings with personnel at Amarillo College. The property is owned by them and they must approve anything to do with this project. They, of course, had approved our submission of the application to the THC for the marker, Our first meeting with Amarillo College personnel was monumental. It took place in the building at 1300 S Polk. Notable attendees were Dr Paul Matney '67, President of Amarillo College, Bruce Cotgreave, AC Physical Plant Director, Terry Berg, Dean of Finance at AC, Ellen Green, Joe Wyatt and a host of others. Of Course all the members of the committee from the Alumni Association were present. During this meeting, Bruce Cotgreave proposed that Amarillo College would construct a mini-park on the east end of the parking area at 1200 S Polk. The main feature in the park wold be the Historical Monument that we had proposed to house the Historical Marker. Everyone agreed this would be a great idea and that we should move forward. In May of 2010, Shiver-Megert & Associates, landscape architects, presented preliminary drawings for the project. Everyone agreed that the project could move forward. However, time and events caused the project to move very slowly.

After final drawings by Shiver-Megert were approved, bids were taken for construction. The cost would be about \$50,00, Unfortunately, around this time in early 2011, the State of Texas had cut millions of dollars from the Amarillo College budget forcing them to allocate only \$10,000 for the project. It seemed that time stood still until it was evident that the Alumni Association would need to seek aid from outside sources. That is when Rita Bryant volunteered to take charge of the fund raising. Rita is a Grant Writer and through her efforts, she was able to obtain \$10,000 from Center City, \$10,000 from William Ware in memory of his mom, Mary Ware, and \$5,000 from the Sisemore family in memory of their mom, Mary Sue Sisemore. The balance will be paid by the AHS 50th Alumni Association. Other large donors are the ahs Class of 1953, \$2,500, and the AHS Class of 1956 donating \$3,500. The remainder is from donations to the project by many members of the Alumni Association.

Now that we have the funds either committed or in the bank, we can move forward with the construction and Dedication of the project With good weather and hard work the project could be completed by the end of 2011. We will Keep you posted on the progress.

As you can see, there are may people to thank. There are many others, not previously mentioned, such as Wes Reeves, Marker Chairman for the Potter County Historical Commission, Charles Sadnick, with the Texas Historical Commission, Arvis Stewart '58 for creating a beautiful sketch of the Historical Monument (in the original proposed setting in front of the old AHS Cafeteria). Gail and Rob, Amarillo Downtown Library,

Valerie Olson at the AISD Library, Warren Stricker with the Panhandle Plains Museum in Canyon, Kelly Chandler with Osgood Monument, Chris Valverde, Senior Planner with the City of Amarillo, and Iris Lawrence, history of African American schools in Amarillo.

A very special thanks to Charlie Broomhead for producing large photo copies of pictures for our displays.



While Sandies were having class reunions in Amarillo, Oct. 24-26, two longtime Sandies were having a reunion of their own in Red Oak, TX, 400 miles to the east. Let me explain.

My daughter, Christie, had a stroke last August and remains somewhat impaired to the extent that she has had to move to a senior (she's 66) living center. On the evening of Oct. 24, I accompanied her to the dining hall for a "Family Night" dinner. As we walked to the dining hall, we were joined by a delightful woman named Norma Lockett. When we were seated at a table, Norma asked me where I was from. "I was born and raised in Amarillo," I said, and she replied, "I grew up in Amarillo, too. Did you go to Amarillo High School?" "Yes," I said, "Class of '53, and you?" "Class of '51," Norma said. "What was your maiden name?" I asked. "Todd," she answered, and I instantly knew she was the sister of my good friend Gordon Todd, also a '53 Sandie, who later became one of Dallas's premier home builders and still lives in the DFW Metroplex. Gordon and I played basketball together at Nixson Junior High. He went on to be a standout Sandie basketballer, while I concentrated on trying to play baseball.

Norma and her husband, the late Norman Lockett, had a long career with Buckner Baptist Benevolences. I had a 56-year journalism career. She and I had a wonderful reunion talking about AHS.

I have had another reunion of sorts while reading the book, Charles Goodnight, Cowman and Plainsman, by J. Evetts Haley. I have been familiar with the Goodnight name since I was a kid in Amarillo and have long known of the ranch he established in Palo Duro Canyon. Goodnight has been called the "Father of the Texas Panhandle." I guess familiarity breeds indifference as well as contempt, however, and I had never read anything about Goodnight, the man, until I happened onto this book written by Haley in 1936. Larry McMurtry must have been thoroughly familiar with the life and exploits of Goodnight when he wrote Lonesome Dove. Many of the adventures Goodnight had in real life are recreated in the exploits of Augustus McRae and Woodrow Call in McMurtry's book and the TV mini-series.

But the reunion I have experienced has been in reading Haley's description of the Llano Estacado, the Staked Plains, the area where Amarillo proudly sits. In my teens, I roamed all over it with my friends, Buddy Glasgow, Dwayne McMinn, Jimmy Gilmore and Bill Nichols. If it rained, we would drive to the Prairie Dog Town Fork of the Red River east of Claude and roll around in the rushing runoff. It's a wonder we didn't drown. On Saturday nights we would seine Tierra Blanca Creek below Buffalo Lake. Miles Childers and I hunted all over his LX Ranch and occasionally would see the ruts of wagon wheels cut into limestone outcroppings and in old buffalo wallows would find a bone or tooth gleaming white in the sun. All of those had been Goodnight's stomping grounds a century and a half earlier.

Haley prompted this nostalgia with his description of the Llano when Goodnight came to the Palo Duro in 1875. For those of us who grew up on the "Llano" this is a "feel good" piece of remembrance. For younger Sandies who have never tasted of the history of the place, it's something they need to read:

"As fall approached (in 1875), he (Goodnight) gathered a herd of sixteen hundred and drifted them (from southeastern Colorado near Las Animas) toward the Llano Estacado, that great plateau of New Mexico and Texas, a wilderness, arid, unsettled, and then almost unknown. As a ranger he had explored its far edges during the Civil War, and had learned something of the country in which he intended to locate".

"Though fifteen expansive years had passed since he began to learn its terrain, it was as yet unclaimed even by pioneer stockmen. Traditionally, it was the Great American Desert, and for Gregg, Marcy, and other early travelers it was truly 'the dreaded Llano Estacado...the great Zahara of North America.' Even in this year, 1875, the Texas Rural Register and Immigrants' Handbook advised the world that it was improbable that the

Staked Plains could 'ever be adapted to the wants of man,' adding that this was 'the only uninhabitable portion of Texas.' But Goodnight recalled its miles of unbroken buffalo turf, its rich gramma grasses, and its scattered waterings. Besides, he never read guidebooks, and hence moved with confidence. He found the land the same as Albert Pike found it forty-three years before, and so aptly explained that:

"No man can form an idea of the prairie, from anything which he sees from east of the Cross Timbers. Broad, level, gray and barren, the immense desert which extends westwardly almost to the shadow of the mountains, is too grand and too sublime to be imaged by the narrow contracted, undulating plains to be found nearer the bounds of civilization."

"Imagine yourself...standing in a plain in which your eye can see no bounds. Not a tree, nor a shrub, not a tall weed that lifts its head above grandeur of the desert; not a stone is to be seen on its hard beaten surface; no undulation, no abruptness, no break to relieve the monotony: nothing...Its sublimity arises from its unbounded extent, its barren monotony and desolation, its still, unmoved, calm, stern, almost self-confident grandeur, it's strange power of deception, it's want of echo, and in fine, its power of throwing a man back upon himself and giving him a feeling of lone helplessness, strangely mingled at the same time with a feeling of liberty and freedom from restraint."

"The principal features--streams, canyons, and springs--that break the sameness of the plateau were named by the New Mexican comancheros and ciboleros. They knew the land intimately for a hundred years before another white race came, and being capable plainsmen, crossed it at random while other frontiersmen thought it an impassable barrier. The naming of the Staked Plains, according to early American chronicles, is due to the staking of a road across its unbroken surface by Spanish travelers, which legend probably has some basis in fact, for even yet, along the western edges of the Plains, cowboys sometimes see the white stone mojoneras--mounds or stakes--which not only guided the hunter and trader along his way, but indicated a nearby seep of water."

"Toward this land Goodnight's outfit pointed his herd..." to eventually wind up in Palo Duro Canyon, where up until only 15 years before, the Kwahadi, the fiercest of the Comanche, the fiercest of all the Plains Indians, made their home.

Right in the middle of all of that is where almost everyone reading this Sandie Spirit got to go to a great place named Amarillo High School. I turned 90 in October, and I've lived away from Amarillo for all but one of my last 67 years. Can you tell I still miss it?
