1961 SANDIE PLAYS BIG ROLE IN THE RECOVERY FROM THE DEVASTATING JULY 4, 2025 FLOOD OF THE GUADALUPE RIVER THAT CALAILED 161 LIVES

Within a week of the disaster, it started-stacks and stacks of cards expressing “thanks” for their dedication, volunteerism, and heroism.

At first, Ingram VFD volunteers and local artist Richard Gwyn (AHS '61) started attaching the cards to the gear racks where firefighters store their equipment, making sure the handwritten notes and pictures of appreciation would catch the eyes of exhausted firefighters.

Through the weeks the collection grew, expanding to the point Gwyn realized he could apply his talents to motivate not only a VFD, but an entire community.

Already well known for his unique Crayola art classes at the Museum of Western Art and his exceptional murals for Vocational Bible School at New Hope Fellowship, Gwyn, a Greenwood Forest resident, began contemplating a long-term display for the thank you notes.

“I am just Joe Q Public,” said Gwyn. “I don’t know how to put out a fire. I have trouble putting a Band-aid on”

“Don’t let Richard Gwynn fool you,” laughs Ingrahm VFD Firefighter Sara Lynch. “He was here when this started. He was here every morning and made us coffee. He was one of the faces I needed to see to keep going. That coffee really did keep us going. He was a support for all of us.”

He made coffee every morning at 5 am for the responders at IVFD. Sometimes his day would last as long as 13 hours.

“At the beginning we had 350 Active people deploying from every day from the station,” said Lynch. “We have 32 active volunteer firefighters.

It soon became evident that what was expected from these first responders-even the most trained-was almost super natural for this group of responders, the children offered solace. Cards from near and far-school children from Kerrville to South Carolina expressed their words and pictures of thanks and encouragement. Somehow people understood expressions from the most innocent and vulnerable were exactly the motivators needed for even the most seasoned volunteer.

Gwyn knew he needed to create a display worthy of the art, thus the concept of a custom display-nine foam panels totaling 32 feet to feature every card received, He already has the materials in his storage barn, including his custom-machined stands to hold the wall in place.

He had to consider numerous factors such as wind, safety and length of staples. His secret ingredient is ceiling tile staples that are long enough to keep the cards in place. However, he is the best curator-still arriving every morning at 5 am and diligently replacing any wayward card.

Created by himself (with a little help from Tammy Landin), his construction is so meticulous that every piece of the display not only has a part number but also may be color coded for repetitive assembly.

He acknowledges that he has been on an emotional roller coaster with this project.

“I saw things I have never seen before in my life,” said Gwyn, “I don’t know that I ever want to see it again, but I will know how to face it if I do. This was something I could do. I hear the firefighters Just stand and look at the display.”

2 ARTICLES FROM NEWLY ELECTED HISTORIAN, GWEN BAINS MURPHY '62

Hi, everyone! I'm Gwen Bains Murphy (class of '62), the newly elected Historian for the AHS 50th Alumni Association. My job is to try to have accessible to you (or the general public) memorabilia covering the years of our great Amarillo High School. Sounds a little daunting, doesn't it?

We are so fortunate that a previous Historian, Gary Biggers, was thorough and meticulous. He inventoried and organized boxes of artifacts that were donated to us.

Some of these were actually artifacts from the different years, but also boxes of decorations that were used for different reunions. But that was years ago, and items have been removed, lost, loaned, etc. So, as I'm attempting to go through our storage unit to see what is there, I find that I've got a lot of work ahead of me. It's my understanding that Gary made a box (numbered and inventoried) as the donations came in, which means that the class years tend to be mixed up in different boxes, etc. So, I'm going to attempt to separate the years for easier access, and have a different system for the decorations, so they're not all mixed together.

The first items I want to address are the yearly annuals. As I went through what was there, I found many missing years. So, I thought I'd bring this to your attention and see if we can find the missing books. It would be great to have a complete set, wouldn't it?

The first annual we have is 1917 and the last we have is 2011.

The ones missing are:

1926, 1943, 1962, 1963, 1965, 1967, 1971, 1977, 1980, 1982, 1987, 1988, 1989, 1991, 2006, 2009 2010.

Maybe you can help find some of these missing years. I know that sometimes school annuals end up in garage sales, antique shops, or junk stores. If you're out and about and notice an AHS annual, get it and send it to us. I'd love that. Or, if you know of a fellow Sandie who is deceased, maybe their family would donate their Sandie memories to us.

I'm going to attempt to write a short note in each Sandie Spirit to let you know what I've found, or what I'm looking for, so you'll know what's going on with the archives. I intend to bring some of the items of particular interest to each of our quarterly meetings.

ANOTHER ARTICLE FROM GWEN BAINS MURPHY '62-HISTORIAN

Below is another article I wrote that I thought might be interesting to you:

The 50th AHS Alumni Association was gifted this summer (2025) with a wonderful book of memories from the AHS class of 1913. The book was donated by Sarah Harrell Williamson of Moulton, Texas. It was her grandmother's, Lera Adair Singleton, who died before Sarah was born.

The book is entitled *School-Girl Days, A Memory Book*. It is full of the happenings of the senior year of 1913. Over the next few Sandie Spirit issues, I'll include excerpts from the book to give you a glimpse of life in Amarillo in 1913. It's all written in beautiful calligraphy. But, the most amazing thing is that she also wrote a history of the Amarillo schools before 1909, and that's what I'm including today. I'll not edit or research any of her "facts", just enjoy the story.

"History of the Amarillo High School"

The first public school in Amarillo was one of the old-fashioned kinds, such as our parents used to attend, one in which all pupils from the A B C class to the big boy, were taught by one teacher.

Mr. C. G. Witherspoon taught the first public school in Amarillo in the fall of 1889. He taught in a one-room frame building, which had been used for a court house in old Amarillo. Mr. Witherspoon did not finish his term, and as there was part of the school fund left, Mrs. Croom, with an assistant, taught three months the next summer.

When school opened the following fall three teachers were employed. In 1892 the attendance had increased until the services of five teachers were required, and at this time an effort was made to grade the school.

The year 1894 is an important one in the school history of Amarillo for it was in that year that the first class graduated. The four who have the honor of being the first graduates of Amarillo school are: Eula Trigg, now Mrs. W. D. Livitchell; Daisy Martin, now Mrs. Thomas Currie; Mary Brooks and Flora McGee. Mrs. Livichell, Mrs. Currie and Miss McGee are living in the city at present. Miss McGee taught science in AHS in 1909-10, and Miss Brooks is an assistant editor of a Fort Worth Newspaper.

By this time the one original school building had been added to until there were five rooms and still there was not sufficient accommodation. So, in 1900 a large brick building was erected of 12th and Polk Street and the entire school was moved from the old house on 18th and Van Buren to the new modern one on Polk Street.

The most important year in the history of the High School is the year 1905-06. This year marks the real beginning of the High School, for it was then that the school got its first affiliation with the University. School was given credit for mathematics, history and

English that year. There were only four H.S. teachers then or three apart from Mr. Wells, who could not give all his time to teaching.

The school had become so crowded by 1906 it was found necessary to add more buildings, so a H.S. was built of 5th and Johnson Street. This for a time, relieved the crowded condition of the schools, but as Amarillo grew, it became necessary in a few years to convert the library, office and the assembly hall into class rooms.

A ward school was built on the north side of the city and cottages were built on the grounds of the Polk and Johnson Street buildings.

Each year since the affiliation there has been a class to graduate. New studies have been introduced, the most important of which are: Spanish, in 1903; and German in 1908. Miss Kritser began the course in Art in 1907. Music – the latest addition to the curriculum in 1910. The work in the old studies was strengthened until the school has gradually increased the number of units of its affiliation to 15. Seven teachers then devoted their time exclusively to the High School work.

The beautiful H.S. Building on Polk street between twelfth and fourteenth was built in 1909, is the best of its kind in the state and is not equaled by any high school building in Texas outside of Dallas and other cities in the Dallas class.(THIS HISTORY WAS WRITTEN IN 1909)

P.S. We knew that “beautiful H.S. building) as Elizabeth Nixson Junior High. Another interesting thing is the sports teams at that time were called the “Savages” and years later was changed to the “Sandies”

AFTERWARD, THEY ADVISED US THEY LOST MONEY ON THE OCTOBER ISSUE AND THE COST WOULD BE OVER DOUBLE WHAT WE PAID FOR THE GOLD PAPER. AS A RESULT, WE ARE RETURNING TO THE GOLD PAPER, SINCE WE CANNOT PAY OVER DOUBLE THE PRINTING COST.

We lived on Taylor St across from Alice Landergin Grade School. One day in 1943 during noon recess, I led a group of 6th and 7th graders across the Sante Fe tracks to a field to get an old car frame. The school yards were used as deposit areas for scrap metal during WWII. We were going to be famous for making this big steel frame deposit. The frame was heavy and we were late getting the frame back to the school. Our efforts only got us a chewing out by the Principal, Miss Davidson. This frame was known to me from hunting in the area with my 22 caliber rifle. When I was 10 years old, I was allowed to buy my first gun and hunt alone. This was normal in "the Good Ole Days".

For the remainder of my junior year and for the entirety of my senior year, my classes were held in Polk Street Methodist Church, First Baptist Church, in portable classrooms that were moved to the AHS campus, and in what portions of the old school building that remained and were still useable.

Most people would probably see this as quite an ordeal, an inconvenience, and a bad situation for the AHS teachers and students. My belief about what happened is quite the opposite of this. Both teachers, students and the whole AHS community not only “survived” the situation, but we embraced the circumstance that we found ourselves in and we thrived, a bit battle scared, but undeterred. Because of what we all experienced together, the Amarillo High School class of 1971 has a unique bond amongst ourselves. I believe that our class ties are significantly stronger and closer than most. I count myself blessed to be a proud “fire years” Sandie!

I graduated with a BA from the University of Texas at Austin in 1975. After college, I returned to Amarillo to work for my family’s retail clothing business, Kline’s, working as the manager of the Western Plaza store for the next 25 years. In 1999, with the death of my dad, Ben Altman, and my brother, Dan Altman-AHS class of 1967, I closed Kline’s after doing business in Amarillo for 60 years and went to work for the Golden Spread Council, Boy Scouts of America.
